

Rotary Clubs Urged To Make Survey Of All Community Needs

Rotary International president Arthur Lagueux, visiting Amherst in the course of a nation-wide tour, urged members to make a survey of their community needs and transform their ideas into action. Mr. Lagueux addressed members of the Amherst, Sackville, Port Elgin and Springhill Rotary at a joint luncheon in the Fort Cumberland Hotel at 1 p.m. yesterday.

The president and Mrs. Lagueux arrived in Amherst at noon and the motorcade, which formed up at the New Brunswick Border, was met on Victoria Street by the Canadian Legion Band. The parade moved through the business section of the town which was gaily decorated for the occasion.

On arrival at the hotel, a civic welcome was extended to the Rotary Leader by Councillor D. C. G. MacLeod on behalf of Mayor Wightman of Amherst and by Mayor E. P. Smith of Sackville. A corsage was presented to Mrs. Lagueux by Mrs. Ralph Zink wife of the Amherst president.

The luncheon which was attended by more than 100, followed a brief reception in the ladies' lounge of the hotel.

The president, in his address, traced the development of Rotary and its importance in world affairs. He said it is a "timely" organization and would not become obsolete despite the ever changing pattern of world events.

The members are bound together by unity of purpose and a bond of Fellowship which is the answer to a great need in the world today. It has a definite place in this present world of disorder and division.

Although he stressed the community service work of the organization he urged the members not to overlook the international aspect of Rotary. He said full support was given to the United Nations and their principles to restore peace.

Mr. Lagueux was introduced by Past District Governor N. T. Avard of Amherst. Mr. Avard gave details of the president's rapid rise to the head of Rotary International and paid tribute to

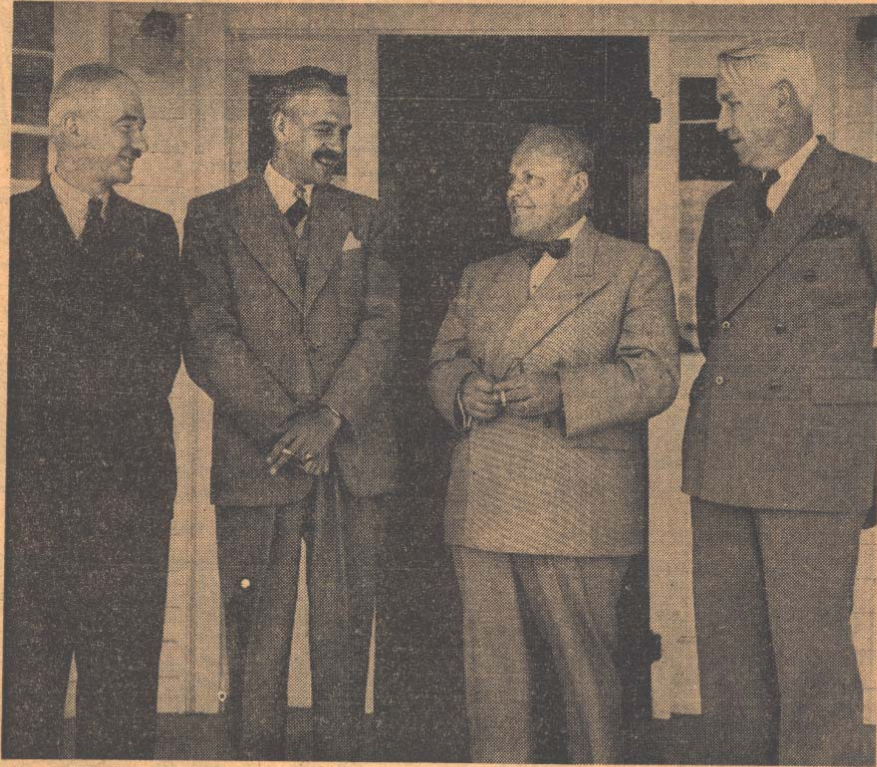
