Last Meeting



It was our great privilege to welcome Rotary International's highest officer for 1950-51, **Arthur Lagueux**, Gentleman, and his gracious wife.

The Champlain Room was almost taxed to capacity due to the fact that not only was it Ladies' Day, but 77 visiting Rotarians were present from 15 different Clubs, including one visitor from Finland.

President Arthur lived up to his reputation as a sincere and inspiring speaker in his address on "Rotary," emphasizing Rotary's ideals of service. "There is no problem in finding good works to do, the problem is to do them" . . . "None of us can fail in our individual lives, nor can any unit of Rotary fail, if each of us lives individually, day by day as a friend and of service to others." Arthur assured us that since the birth of Rotary in 1905, its growth has clearly indicated the universal acceptance of the principle of service above self. But we must be mindful of the fact that we cannot afford to let our growth blind us to our individual obligations. Rotary, he said, has a contribution to make which

Behind the Iron Curtain there was a groping for the very thing for which Rotary stood, and it is to be hoped that gradually world conditions will so modify as to make possible the further extension of Rotary for the sake of those people who desire peace and understanding.

"We are a service-dedicated idea, and if sometimes our aim is beyond our capacity, let it not make us fainthearted. . . . A man's reach should exceed his grasp, or what's heaven for?"
