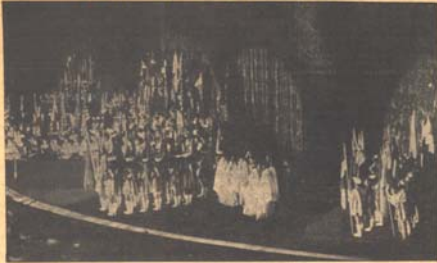


PAGEANT, ELECTION AND AUSTIN'S SPEECH HIGHLIGHT ROTARY CONVENTION

## Austin Tells Rotary U.S. Will Provide U.N. Global Force Troops

Warren R. Austin, chief delegate to the United Nations, said last night the United States would disclose soon how many troops it would earmark for use by the U. N. in future emergencies.

Austin made his declaration at the second primary session of the Rotary International third annual convention in the Municipal Auditorium. Some 12,000 members and their families from 60 nations are attending the meeting.

This was the first official announcement that the United States would contribute to a global emergency force, although the U. S. originated the matter for peace resolution under which the proposed U. N. Army is being set up.

Under the United Nations plan, approved last fall by 41 nations, all

members of the U. N. are called upon to report what forces they are prepared to organize, train and equip for service as U. N. units.

The plan is designed for long-range operations, and is not intended to play any part in the present fighting in Korea.

In announcing that the U. S. would respond promptly to this appeal, Austin said:

"I shall be able very soon to transmit to the United Nations, on behalf of the Government of the United States, a specific statement of the types and strength of the forces available."
